Set Free By Christ The Letter to Philemon

Intro: In this, the shortest and most personal of Paul's letters, he commends the faith and charity of Philemon; and sends back to him his fugitive servant, Onesimus, whom he had led to faith in Christ, in connection with his Roman imprisonment.
